Ronald (Tom) Horne 12th January 1935 - 5th September 2010



Tom was born in Tebworth and then when he married he moved to Wingfield. He was one of the few elderly residents of the Parish who were born and lived here all their lives.

He went to Chalgrave School and Toddington Secondary Modern School. In his youth he played football for Hockliffe and cricket for Chalgrave and Milton Bryan.

He started work for Ron Osborn and then worked for Roses on the milk round. He was called up for national service and this he spent in Oswestry in an Officer Training Unit of the Royal Artillery.

When he finished his term of national service he applied to Blue Circle for employment as a lorry driver, and although he had a very good reference for driving he was not old enough at the time to drive a lorry outside of the army, but they employed him until he was of the right age. This employment was to last for over 30 years, all of which were accident free.

After leaving the army he still played cricket, but football was more support of Luton Town and he attended Wembley with other members of his family at the Cup Final. although as you know Luton did not win. He attended Wembley again later when Luton were in (I think it was called the Littlewoods Cup), this time they won.

He joined Toddington Old Boys Association and did a turn as Chairman. He gave a talk about life and people in Toddington and was asked after the meeting if the notes could be handed over for inclusion in a book about Toddington memories. Tom did not need notes all he had was names on a piece of paper and the rest was in his head. People who knew Tom well will tell you he had a fantastic memory for events and people, and always seemed to have an answer if you asked him a question.

Tom did not like change and was very much a keep things as they are man, which did not go down well with everyone, but Tom was someone who, what you saw was what you got. He had a sense of humour that not everyone appreciated and he also loved children and children always seemed to be attracted to him.

He will leave a vacant spot in lots of hearts, non more so than his family. June Horne,

There was wonderful news for South Bedfordshire and beyond this week with the news that the start of works on the long awaited Dunstable bypass is now estimated to take place in 2014. The Public Inquiry will start "as soon as possible" according to a letter to South West Bedfordshire MP Andrew Selous from Roads Minister Mike Penning dated 28th October 2010.


The letter explains that the A11 dualling project has a higher net present value per £ than the A5-M1 link, even on the basis of the £50 million private developer contribution to the A5-M1 link which lowers the cost to the public purse to £100 million.

The Government proposes to meet Central Bedfordshire Council and the private developer as a matter of urgency to agree heads of terms between the Highways Agency and the developer. Unfortunately the new junction 11a can not be built as the M1 junctions 10 to 13 hard shoulder running contract let by the last Government did not include junction 11a and so the junction can not be built concurrently with the hard shoulder running. This will end up costing the taxpayer more.

The Secretary of State for Transport, Philip Hammond, will come to visit the proposed A5-M1 link shortly to see for himself how badly it is needed and all the wider benefits to the whole community that will occur when it is built.

Andrew Selous said "This letter is fantastic news for Dunstable, Houghton Regis, Leighton Buzzard, Linslade and our surrounding villages. This bypass is the key to 6,800 new jobs, the regeneration of Dunstable and Houghton Regis as well as making Leighton Buzzard and Linslade a more attractive location for business. It will help us build some of the homes we need for local people as well. I look forward to welcoming the Secretary of State here shortly to see all this for himself."

Welcome from All Saints Church

On the first Sunday in each month we have a shorter service, sometimes accompanied by a band, and as the service is child friendly as we do not have a Sunday School.

I'm writing this letter on the 1st day of November, All Saints Day, the day when the Christian Church remembers and gives thanks for all those people whose example of holy, faithful and sacrificial living has been an inspiration and encouragement to us. Last night we held our annual Remembrance and Thanksgiving service in church, when people came along to remember loved ones who have died, and to give thanks for their lives and their love. One of the most moving and beautiful parts of the service happens as people come forward to light a candle and offer their own silent prayers of thanksgiving and remembrance. And as our service in church came to a close, children gathered for a 'Bright Party', a celebration of the goodness and light of the Holy Spirit, an alternative to the potential menacing darkness which seems to mark our present day Halloween.

The emphasis on light as part of our season of remembrance gives us a timely reminder that if it wasn't for the birth of Jesus Christ we would not have the comfort that the light of his love offers at the difficult and frightening times of our lives. One of the most important passages in the Bible speaks of the Light coming in to the world as Christ is born. They are beautiful, poetic and poignant words, and come at the beginning of the Gospel of St John: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through Him, and without Him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.' This is what Christmas is all about ~ the birth of Jesus, the Light of the World, a light which nothing can extinguish, not even death.

God came into the world, in the flesh of a human baby, so that the whole of creation could know what it is to live in the light of perfect love. Jesus showed us what God is like; his life, death and resurrection illuminated the life of God for us and in us. We were given, through his birth, the ability to shine with the light of God, to bring love to the dark places of the world, and to be beacons of hope. The star shone over the stable and led people to see the new born King. May the brightness of the Light of the World shine in our hearts this Christmas and lead others into the warmth and light of God's eternal love.

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
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
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

I list details of my email correspondence with Natural England. I won't comment further. Make of it what you will! Questions by Ken Green Answers by Cressida Mansfield, Wildlife Management Adviser, Natural England

I am very concerned about you granting permission to destroy this badger sett. Could you please explain the reasons and answer the questions below.

Q - Did you visit the site?

A -A site visit was carried out in August to discuss the application and visit the badger sett. The problem and possible solutions were discussed.

Q - Did you realise that the location of the sett is not at SP984-286 as quoted but a long way away at SP992-273? This seems to me to be a serious discrepancy would you not agree?

A -The grid reference given on the licence is, as you have identified, incorrect. I apologise for this, it is an error. A revised licence will be issued to correct the error in the grid reference. The site visit established the location and nature of the sett at the correct location.

Q - Did you realise that the sett is in a hedgerow beside a farm track / footpath and that the it has been there for many years, at least 50. It has not changed in appearance much over this time and has never seemed to cause any problem before so why now?

A-I realise the sett has been in place for many years and has not caused problems until now. The licence application was made as an entrance hole to the sett has been dug within the green lane. Sheep are regularly driven along this track between fields, and recently a sheep has stumbled in the badger sett entrance hole and broken it's leg. There is also concern that the badger sett is causing visible subsidence of the ground of the track, which may result in the collapse of the ground when vehicles are driven along it during the course of normal farming operations.

Q - The reason given is to prevent "serious damage to property". What property would that be? There are no barns or houses in the close vicinity. The closest barn is around 500 metres away and

the closest house around 1000 metres away. A-'Damage to property' in this case includes the sheep which use the green lane regularly and are at risk of injury, and also the potential damage to vehicles should the track collapse under their weight as a result of the badger tunnels beneath the track.

Q - I understand that badgers are very territorial and setts stay in existence sometimes for many hundreds of years. What is the likely outcome of this event. would the badgers not attempt to dig another sett close to the same location?

A-You are correct to say badgers are territorial, and when a sett is excluded there is always the potential for a new sett to be dug close to that which is being excluded. All applicants are made aware of this at the time of the site visit. Following exclusion, badgers may potentially relocate to another sett within their territory and/or expand an existing sett, or create a new one. The licence will not prevent this, it is only to try and help resolve the current problem.

Q - My understanding from a wildlife officer in Central Bedfordshire says that "Natural England do not generally issue these licences lightly and a very strong case has to be made" Could you please explain what this strong case was and how the process works. Is there no consultation process? Would it not be a courtesy at least to contact the Parish Council.

A -Natural England is the statutory authority for issuing licences. We do not routinely consult with local authorities or parish councils prior to the issue of a licence. Where a licence may impact on a designated site (e.g. a Site of Special Scientific Interest), we do consult with the local Natural England team for their views on the impacts of any licence on the nature conservation interest of the site.

Q - We all understand the dilemma surrounding TB in badgers but this is quite different. I'm sure you can understand that people get very upset when an act there to protect wildlife is used in this way.

A - Licences are only issued where they satisfy the criteria set out in legislation and Natural England Policy. Badger Licences can only be issued if the works are for one of the purposes set out in the legislation, in this case, for the 'prevention of serious damage to property'. The works licensed need to have an expectation that they will help resolve the problem, and there should be no satisfactory alternative to the licensed action. The licence was issued as it was deemed to meet these criteria.



Dogs Fouling Footpaths

There have been several references to dogs fouling footpaths in previous editions of The Chalgrave News. The following article was in a number of local and national papers and it demonstrates that the issue is rather more serious than a few people having to clean their shoes when they return home from a walk!

Dog mess fall girl 'could lose eye'

A toddler who fell in dog mess in a playground could lose the sight in one of her eyes, it has been reported.

Amiee Langdon, who will be two next week, put her hand down as she tumbled over, then wiped her left eye.

She was taken to hospital by her mother Suzanne, 29, from Fallowfield, Manchester, where tests confirmed she had picked up the infection toxocariasis, which is spread by dog dirt.

It resulted in optical lobe cellulosis, which can lead to blindness and even death if not treated within 72 hours.

Amiee, whose eye has been almost closed by the swelling, is being treated with three antibiotics at the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital. If medication does not work, surgeons may have to remove Amiee's eye to stop the infection spreading.

She was playing in a gated children's area of Platt Fields Park, Fallowfield, when the incident happened last week. Her mother has appealed to "thoughtless" dog owners to clear up after their pets.

Paul Andrews, executive member for neighbourhood services at Manchester City Council, said: "I hope this extremely upsetting incident makes irresponsible dog owners understand the very real consequences of failing to pick up after their dogs. We are thinking about this little girl and her family and we hope she makes a speedy recovery."

Please do not leave your dogs mess on grass verges outside private residences, especially down The Lane, as the occupier has to clear up this unsightly mess!

West's Education Charity — Update

The number of applications for grants has risen considerably over the past 10 years and we have reached the position where there is insufficient income to preserve the capital base for future generations and to pay out all applications in full. We therefore have to adopt guidelines in an attempt to be as fair as possible to everyone. These rules have to be flexible and sometimes they need to be tweaked, particularly in times such as the present, when interest rates are so low and our income has fallen.

We recently held a meeting to discuss how we could better distribute the charity's income. We decided to radically overhaul our guidelines. One major change is the **abolition of uniform grants**. This was very much a relic from the old days when parents from poor families needed help to buy uniforms to send their children to grammar schools.

At the same time, we realise that the financial pressures on those in higher education have increased considerably and we have therefore increased our student grant to £250 per half year, a full £500 per year.

Below is a list of the changes and new guidelines, but please, please remember that they are not cast in stone and if you or your child receives a cheque for less, it is probably because we had to reduce everyone's grant to fit the income available at that particular time.

Main changes:

- · the abolition of the £40 uniform grants
- the abolition of the £100 16 18 yrs grant
- · the abolition of grants for routine travel expenses
- all applications on behalf of young people under the age of 18 are now made by parents/carers.

New guidelines:

- Applicants must reside in the villages of Hockliffe or Chalgrave and be under the age of 25.
- All applications on behalf of children/young people under the age of 18 at the time of the application MUST BE MADE by a parent/carer on behalf of that child/young person.
- All applications on behalf of young people aged 18 to 24 at the time of the application should be made by that young person him/herself.

- · We would usually expect to pay:-
 - a. a student grant of £250 per half year for those in full time higher education (those still at school do not qualify)
 - b. 50% of the cost of lessons in the performing arts (music, dance, drama etc)
 - c. 40% of the cost of sporting activities (football, rugby, cricket, netball, riding etc)
 - d. 75% of the cost of swimming lessons (except for children attending Hockliffe Lower School, who get swimming lessons free of charge through the school, financed by West's Charity)
- We will continue to make contributions to school trips of an educational nature (this does not include trips which are wholly for leisure, such as Alton Towers, Legoland etc)
- We will only pay routine travel expenses in exceptional circumstances
- There will be a maximum grant of £200 per child/young person per application, except for:
 - a. those receiving the £250 student grant
 - b. out of the ordinary, one-off events
 - c. exceptional circumstances

It is very important that you remember that these are only examples. ANYONE under 25 residing in Hockliffe or Chalgrave is encouraged to apply for a grant towards ANY educational activity. NOTHING WHATSOEVER is ruled out, so long as the activity is educational.

Receipts are required to support all applications, except the £250 student grant. It is very rare that this rule is waived and there must be an extremely good reason. No receipt usually means no grant.

These new guidelines will apply from 2011 but the Trustees can and may vary them, especially if there is insufficient income from the fund to meet all applications. In those circumstances the Trustees may well either lower the £200 cap or reduce all applications by the same percentage or both.

Deadline for 2010 applications is 30th December.

Preparing for Transition?




