Annual Chairman's Report

The Parish Council consists of myself as the Chairman, and I am also one of the Council representatives of the West Trust; Ken Green who is the Vice Chairman and heads up the Footpaths Committee and has responsibility for the Website: Daniel Osborn who is on the Planning Committee, is our Police Liaison as well as the second Council representative on the West Trust: Debbie Hampson also on the Planning Committee and will be co-leading the Pond Project; Roger Mence who is able to attend many external meetings on our behalf; Sharon Brown who sorts out any fly-tipping and along with Debbie will be co-leading the Pond Project; we have a new co-opted member Mike Wells.

Derek Smith stepped down from the Council earlier this year as he has moved out of the Parish. Mike is going to take over Traffic Calming responsibilities and will be looking for people to help and work with him. He will be operating our speed monitoring sign at various locations in the Parish. And of course the most important member of the Parish Council, and this is Lesley Smith who is our Parish Clerk.

As always the past year has been a very active one for the Parish Council. In case you are not aware we do a lot of work behind the scenes. We work on a voluntary basis trying to do as much as we can for our local community.

As well as our monthly meetings and individual responsibilities we attend local and area meetings where decisions are made that can affect our Parish. We lobby MP's and local councillors, we defend the rural nature of our community, we encourage and support local activities, we look for ways of improving facilities and the infrastructure, we strive to keep our community spirit and, as your representatives, we listen to you.

This year's precept - in the breakdown of your Council Tax it would appear that the Parish Council have increased the precept by over 6%. At our meeting in February we decided that we would not increase the precept this year 2013/14. The increase has come from Central Beds Council. CBC calculates the amount householders pay for the precept by dividing what we ask for by the number of Band D properties in the Parish. There are, however, some Band D properties that, because of special circumstances, will get a reduced rate and be charged at a band C Rate. In the past Central Government has paid the difference direct to the Councils Central Government has now stopped this. Now CBC calculates the tax base by dividing the number of Band D properties paying

The accounts can be viewed via the Clerk, as can all Parish Council documentation – minutes of meetings, correspondence, accounts, etc. - if you are a resident of the Parish

Planning is one of our many concerns, both at a Parish and County level. Within our Parish, we will see all planning applications and we can make comments and objections for Central Beds to consider We are also keen to make sure residents abide by the planning rules.

At a County and National level we are very vocal in our determination to protect the Green Belt. We look to our Central Beds Councillor and our MP to represent and support our views at local and National level.

Speeding vehicles and articulated lorries coming through our Parish are always a problem.

Mike will doing speed checks using our mobile speed sign in both Tebworth and Wingfield. When the M1/A5 link road is open we have been told that we will get a weight ban through Tebworth. We will also press for a 20 mph zone through the Parish.

We continue to pressure Highways to repair our roads which have suffered over the winter. We are particularly concerned about Hill Close and The Lane. We have had some of the potholes around the Parish filled but there is more to do. It has also been brought to our attention the poor state of the pathway

from the Oueens Head and down The Lane

We have successfully applied for the Oueens Head to become a Community Asset Central Beds have a scheme whereby a piece of land or building that is central to the community and is used by the community can become an asset. This means that whoever owns the land or building cannot dispose of it without consulting the community. There is a six month consultation period. So if Colin decides to retire. Charles Wells cannot immediately sell the building and land or apply for a change of use. There is a small 'working group' exploring ways to keep the Oueens Head.

The pond in Tebworth is getting into a poor state. Debbie and Sharon have agreed to lead a pond project to look into dredging it and tidying up the surrounds but they will need help. Please can we have volunteers so that we form a working party.

A lot happens in our Parish and we should be proud of our community spirit. We have had the Rogation Walk, Coronation Street Party in Tebworth on1st June and of course the Village e on 6th July. Gan

Improving the NHS

In April Bedfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group took over the running of the NHS in Bedfordshire. The Chief Clinical Officer is long serving Dunstable GP Dr Paul Hassan. I am delighted that for the first time in my 12 years as an MP. I now see a doctor to discuss Bedfordshire NHS issues rather than an NHS manager, even though many have been excellent in the past.

In a recent speech in the House of Commons I said how pleased I was that in Bedfordshire, Dr Paul Hassan has told me that there will be unannounced GP visits to the wards of the Luton and Dunstable hospital and other hospitals to which Bedfordshire sends its patients. There will be private Trip Adviser style patient reports coming back—not report forms handed by a sister to a patient and filled in while the sister is leaning over them, but done genuinely in privacy so that GPs can get a proper report of what is happening.

There will also be real-time alert buttons on the keyboards of GPs and clinicians so that they can flag it up immediately if things are going wrong. That is the way to get an early indication of what is going wrong to make sure that we never have a repeat of what happened at Mid Staffordshire hospital in the NHS.

The number of patients waiting more than a year for treatment has fallen from over 18.000 in Mav 2010 to just 842 patients which is very welcome. MRSA rates are down by half and 400,000 more operations per year are being performed than before the general election. Resources have also been redirected to the front line with 7,000 fewer managers and 7,000 more frontline clinical staff. including nearly 6,000 more doctors.

A number of important reforms are being implemented to ensure compassionate care throughout the NHS in response to the Mid Staffs scandal. We are creating a Chief Inspector of Hospitals and the introduction of Ofsted-style ratings to embed a culture of compassionate care and zero harm. We are also increasing funding for hospices by £60 million and extending the family nurse partnership programme which will give more young and disadvantaged parents one to one support to bring up their babies.

The government is also committed to increasing the proportion of people who get a diagnosis for their dementia from the unacceptably low 39% at the time of the election. Prompt dementia diagnosis means drugs can be prescribed to slow down the progression of dementia.

We are working to make the NHS paperless by 2018 by increasing the use of digital medical records through locally determined solutions. We also want to

Link Road, Traffic and Development

I continue to meet with CBC officers on the traffic implications of the 2,500 new homes east of Leighton Buzzard. Although the A5-M1 link road is a welcome development and will no doubt improve the current



traffic situation, the concern is that its benefits may be negated by the thousands of new homes proposed for both Leighton Buzzard and Houghton Regis. The formal planning applications for the 7,000 homes north of Houghton Regis and the 2,500 east of Leighton Buzzard are expected this summer/autumn and I will continue to represent the views and concerns of Chalgrave parish.

Buses, Planning and the Queen's Head

I have been supporting the parish on many issues, such as buses, planning applications and recently, giving my support at Central Bedfordshire Council to ensure the parish council's application to have the Queen's Head made a community asset is approved, which it was last month.

This means that if the pub is ever put up for sale, the community have the right to bid on it before it potentially becomes something else. This is the first asset to have made use of this new legislation and I am proud Chalgrave is leading the way within Central Bedfordshire.

DO YOU WANT TO STOP COMMERCIAL COMPANIES HAVING ACCESS TO YOUR DETAILS ON THE ELECTORAL REGISTER?

Important changes to your details on the electoral register

From **October** this year there will be changes to the way that you can protect your details on the electoral register should you **not** wish them to be sold to third parties.

There are two versions of the electoral register – the **full register**, which only certain organisations can access and the **edited register**, which anyone can buy. Your details will appear on the edited register unless you ask for them to be removed. Currently 117,000 people within Central Bedfordshire Council area have requested their name and address to be excluded from the edited version of the register.

In the past we carried over requests to be excluded from the edited register, but we will no longer be allowed to do this. If you want to have your details permanently excluded from the edited register you can write to us at Priory House, Monks Walk, Chicksands SG17 5TQ or email us at: electoral.registration@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk making a permanent opt-out request.

Please ensure that you state your full name and address and that you wish your details to be excluded from the edited register on a permanent basis or until further notice. A separate

Queens Coronation

In 1953 my parents were living abroad and were pleased to receive a letter from my aunt telling them about the coronation.

The following is an excerpt from the letter:

Fiona Parker

"Joan and I had a most marvellous view of the coronation procession and saw it extremely well three times as we were just the Trafalgar Square side of Admiralty Arch. We were only the 5th row so could see right into the coaches. It was icy cold and poured with rain at intervals, but there was so much to see one just did not notice the weather. We had to be in our seats by 6 am, but it was our lucky day as Jock, from the garage underneath the flat, took us right to our stand in the Rolls on his way to pick up some customers from the Savoy. We felt serene swishing along in our Rolls past all the grey faced people who had been camping on the pavement all night in the rain. Nobody can have mistaken us for Abbey guests as we were swathed in coats and macs and clutching picnic things!

"By the third time, one knew just who one wanted to look out for. The Queen looked radiant going to the Abbey but rather weighed down by crown, sceptre and orb on the return. Margaret looked very wan and drawn – perhaps accentuated by the Queen Mother beside her. Marina looked wonderful and Alexandra is a lovely child, very like her mother. ... You wouldn't have thought there was a socialist in England from the cheers that greeted Winston! He looked rather like a Xmas Tree and his face looked like a freshly powdered baby's. It was so nice to see the army not in khaki again, except for the Home Guard. There seemed to be thousands of troops marching by and after a time the whole of Trafalgar Square seemed to be swaying. We almost wanted Kwells!

"Apart from our Royal family, quite the most popular person in the procession was Queen Salote of Tonga. She is 6 foot 3 and had the most enormous bare arm I have ever seen. Why she didn't catch pneumonia I can't think as she was in evening dress in an open carriage with pink feathers sticking up at the back of her head rather like Widow Twankey. The Queen left the Abbey later than expected and the whole procession was halted 15 - 20 minutes waiting for her. The weather chose that moment to deluge. We had Queen Salote sitting in this downpour in the middle of Trafalgar Square and she was the only one who refused to have her carriage closed. The enormous crowd gave her round after round of cheers and she sat soaked through smiling and waving. According to my newspaper, she has a sense

Computer Corner

Hello and welcome once more to Computer Corner, written by Mike Wells of Chalgrave IT Solutions.

This month's topic concerns a most important part of maintaining any computer system – **INSTALLING UPDATES.** This process is critical to keeping your PC running smoothly and safely.

Everything that you do on a computer requires software - whether this is the Operating System (most commonly Windows) which is what controls the various pieces of hardware in a computer, or an application such as Microsoft Word. Excel or Internet Explorer. Every piece of software inevitably contains errors - these errors could stop part of the software from working properly (or at all!), or could make part of the machine able to be exploited by viruses or malware (What's the difference? Simply put a virus is designed to cause malicious damage, whereas malware is normally designed to mislead, misdirect or obtain personal information from you and supply it to others).

Originally malware was designed to exploit these errors (or vulnerabilities to use tech speak) in Windows. But as time passed and Microsoft got better at fixing and preventing these errors, the malware writers cast about for alternative avenues of attack. So nowadays they also exploit many other software programs, some of which you'll have heard of (e.g. Java, Adobe Reader) and many that you probably don't (e.g. Adobe Air, Microsoft .Net framework).

So, what to do about all this? Most software these days has an auto-update feature which checks regularly for updates and prompts you to install them, normally in the form of 'pop-ups' down by the clock. Microsoft has a regular update slot (the 2nd Tuesday of each month, known as Patch Tuesday) when they release their latest security updates. In general if you are prompted to install updates, and you recognise where they have come from then they should be installed.

But what happens in reality? People either forget them, ignore them or don't install them because they are scared that it could be malware designed to look like these updates (you see they get you any way they can!).



The Life of Pi, written by Yann Martel, has sold over ten million copies worldwide, won many book awards and was eventually turned into a film which was released last year. The film apparently is very much

better than the book, due mainly to the brilliant visual effects. It tells the story of Pi, Pi being short for Piscine Molitor Patel, who lives with his family in Pondicherry, India. The book is split into three main sections, the first part is Pi as an adult reminiscing about his childhood and growing up with a keen interest and understanding of animals mainly due to the fact that his parents own a zoo. The second part of the book centres on the family's decision to sell the zoo and most of the animals and move to Canada. They set sail on a freighter, bringing some of their animals, but unfortunately the ship sinks during a storm. Pi's family die but he is left stricken on a lifeboat with a Bengal tiger, a hyena, a zebra and an orang-utan. As you would expect the hyena, zebra and orang-utan don't last long and Pi is left with the tiger. They both survive and Pi is picked up on a Mexican beach, the tiger disappears into the undergrowth. The last part of the book, and look away now if you don't want to know how it ends, sees Pi in a hospital bed giving the authorities an account of what happened, but instead of animals being with him he tells them that it was his mother, a cook and a sailor who were shipwrecked with him, because he does not think they will believe his story. Eventually he does tell them about the animals and gives them the option of which story to believe - which kind of makes you wonder yourself which version to believe

This is a book you could analyse all day; were the animals real or were they an indication of his state of mind? Believability seems to be the key theme running through this book.

Most of the Book Club enjoyed the book, but a few found it disappointing in that it did drag on a bit, especially at the beginning. Quite savagely brutal in some places when the tiger attacked the other animals.

The Book Club are currently reading a Stephen King novel, The Stand and a review will appear in the next edition.
