WHY WE MUST REDUCE IMMIGRATION FURTHER

A few years ago it was sometimes thought that you were racist if you talked about reducing immigration. That is certainly not the case now and it is right that the Government takes action to bring down immigration further. We should not leave people on benefits and continue to allow high levels of immigration.

I strongly welcome the Immigration Bill which was published recently as it will benefit British people in a number of important ways. Illegal immigrants will be deterred from coming to the UK in the first place and will be more effectively identified and removed from the UK. The costs of the immigration system will be reduced through fewer appeals and more cost recovery through fees. All of this will reduce pressure on services to free up capacity for the lawfully resident population.

While there is clearly more to do, our immigration reforms are working. Immigration is down by almost a fifth since its peak in 2010 and net immigration is down by a third. The rules have already been reformed to cut out abuse while maintaining the UK's position as an attractive place to live and work for the brightest and best from overseas who we need to help power our economy forward.

The Bill will make it easier to identify illegal immigrants by extending powers to collect and check fingerprints. There will also be additional powers to search for passports and to examine the status and credibility of immigrants seeking to marry or enter into a civil partnership.

We will make it more difficult for illegal immigrants to live in the UK by requiring private landlords to check the immigration status of their tenants to prevent those with no right to live in the UK from moving in to private rented housing. We will also bring in a new requirement for temporary immigrants to make a contribution to the NHS.

Illegal immigrants will also be prevented from opening bank accounts by requiring the banks to check against a database of known immigration offenders before opening accounts. Illegal immigrants will also be kept off the road as the immigration status of driving licence applicants will be checked before licences are issued and licences will be revoked where immigrants are found to have overstayed in the UK.

The Welfare Reform Act has already prevented illegal immigrants from receiving contributory benefits. The Government are also taking further steps to tighten immigrant access to benefits and the strengthened test will be introduced by the end of this year.

If mainstream parties do not take these actions which have strong public backing then extremist parties will gain ground. Illegal immigrants have been found working in my constituency in 2011 and I also made sure that the requirement to speak Polish for a minimum wage job was withdrawn, as soon as I was alerted to it.

I want my constituents to have full and fair access to all the jobs being created locally and this Immigration Bill will help achieve that.

Link Road, Traffic and Development

I continue to meet with Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) officers on the implications for the parish of the 2,500 new homes east of Leighton Buzzard and the 7,000 homes north of Houghton Regis. Although the A5-M1 link road is a welcome development and will no doubt improve the current traffic situation, the concern is that the proposed thousands of new homes do not still overwhelm the area. I will continue to represent the views and concerns of Chalgrave parish as these two strategic planning applications progress through the planning system. Construction of the A5-M1 link road is expected to begin next year.

No Council Tax Increase

Since 2009 when CBC was created central government funding reductions as a result of the national debt crisis, has meant £45 million has been taken out of Central Bedfordshire's budgets. However, the Council has been determined not to pass on this difficult funding problem by raising tax on residents. Instead CBC has made efficiencies and savings throughout its more than 100 services. I have been representing our concerns as rural communities do have some unique differences to Bedfordshire's towns, and I am grateful for the supportive correspondence from residents which has helped me to argue for our villages.

Buses, Planning and the Queen's Head

I have been supporting the parish on many issues, such as buses, planning applications and recently, giving my support at CBC to ensure the parish council's application to have the Queen's Head made a community asset is approved, which it was. This means that if the pub is ever put up for sale, the community have the right to bid on it before it potentially becomes something else. This is the first asset to have made use of this new legislation and I am proud Chalgrave is leading the way within Central Bedfordshire.

I hold a ward surgery every month, which is advertised on village notice boards and CBC's web site, and I attend the monthly parish council meetings of each of the six parishes I represent. I can also be contacted on 01525 234000 or mark.versallion@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk.

Parking at the bottom of Wingfield Road. We are concerned, along with some residents, about cars parking too close to the junction with Toddington Road. If cars are too close to the junction it makes sight lines very difficult if you are turning into Wingfield Road from Toddington Road. Please do not park here. (Highway Code – 'do not stop or park ...within ten metres of a junction.')

Crime increase in rural areas. There has been a general increase of breakins and theft in rural areas – garages, sheds and houses, also vehicle crime. Hockcliffe and Heath and Reach have seen a doubling of the number of incidents from the previous years. We have had a spate of burglaries in our Parish – please make your property secure and if you see anything or anybody suspicious please report it. Our PCSO is PCSO Dodkins, 07949 044666 or 01582 473418.

Highways. Lesley, Dan and I met up with Alan Trille. Alan is our area steward for local highways maintenance. We toured the Parish pointing out where we felt work was needed. Inevitably there is a shortage of money available for repairs. However, he has agreed to find funds to fill in some of the bigger potholes down The Lane; crowning The Lane further down beyond the bridge; repairs to the surface at the top of The Lane and Toddington Road; make safe the footpath outside Forge Cottage and Number 2, Hockliffe Road; repairs to the setts by the boundary gateway on Hockliffe Road; clearing the gulley at Parkview Lane; various repairs along Wingfield and Tebworth Roads; repairs to Featherbed Lane near New Barns; pothole repairs along Chalgrave Road.

Pond. We are sending off for grants to get work done on the pond.

Fly tipping. We have seen an increase in fly tipping in our Parish. Again, if you see anything suspicious please report it. Cllr Brown will contact CBC to remove any items.

Gritting. We are expecting delivery of a ton of salt from CBC as part of their Salt Bag Scheme.

Beer festival. Many congratulations to the team behind the very successful Beer Festival. A great community event. We should feel proud of our community.

Finally, we would like to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and New Year.

The Bedfordshire Chamber of Commerce and the local branch of the Federation of Small Businesses also help plan for emergencies and encourage local businesses to prepare for their own crisis like fire, theft or supply chain problems. 





Trust Your Eyes

We have read a couple of Linwood Barclay books already and thoroughly enjoyed them, so we had no hesitation in opting for another one and this one didn't

disappoint, so much so that we read yet another one straight after called *The Accident*.

Trust Your Eyes is about a map-obsessed schizophrenic called Thomas who spends his days and nights on a virtual tour of the world through his computer screens on a sophisticated version of Google Earth. Then one day he sees something on his computer that shouldn't be there – a woman being murdered behind a window on a New York street. His father has just been killed in an accident and his brother, Ray, has come to stay to help out. Ray gets involved and goes to New York, mainly to appease his brother and put an end to the mystery, however, things escalate and they soon find themselves wrapped up in not only one murder but several. Linwood Barclay writes cracking thrillers that you can't put down and this one and *The Accident* are no exceptions. His characters are always believable and the stories original and fast moving with twists and turns right up until the end.

In *The Accident* Glen Garber's wife is killed in a car accident, one she seems to have caused through drink driving resulting in the deaths of two other people. Her husband struggles to come to terms with this but gradually things happen that suggest her accident might not have been her fault and that someone may have killed her. Grieving and in denial, Glen decides to investigate the accident himself and begins to uncover corruption and secret illegal activity involving selling counterfeit goods. Another book which you can't put down and the Book Club were split in deciding which one was he better.

We at the Book Club have just had our annual "not quite Christmas" lunch. We like to get together for lunch in November instead of December before it gets busy with Christmas parties and we can avoid yet another Christmas dinner. This year we went to The Birch in Woburn. It was excellent, food very good, service very good and of course the company next to none.

Computer Corner

Hello and welcome to this edition of Computer Corner, written by Scott Abraham of Chalgrave IT Solutions.

As you may have seen or heard on the news over the past few weeks, there is a particularly nasty new virus called 'Cryptolocker'. This virus is of a type known as a 'ransomware', as the virus writers demand money from you for it to be removed, or to undo the damage it has caused to your computer. Unfortunately in most cases, this never actually happens – even if you pay the ransom.

Once installed, Cryptolocker will start encrypting the files and documents stored on your computer's hard drive making them unreadable. It will encrypt all types of files ranging from photos, videos, word documents, spreadsheets, pdf files and more. The encryption used is unbreakable unless you have the key, which is generated during the encryption process – this is where they hold you to ransom! While they are still on your machine – you will NEVER be able to open them again!

After encrypting your files, Cryptolocker shows a screen warning that you have 72 hours to pay \$300 (£200) in order to purchase the decryption key and get your files unlocked. We strongly recommend that you DO NOT pay the ransom – EVER! There is no guarantee that doing so will even result in the restoration of your files and will most likely just leave you out of pocket and your financial details compromised.

The virus spreads in many ways, but mainly in emails that contain malicious attachments

or links. Cryptolocker often arrives in an attachment such as a .pdf file and tricks the user into opening it to view some 'important' details. The email that arrives could look like it is from a financial institution or your bank. It may also appear to be from a delivery company such as TNT, UPS and other similar courier companies. Therefore, if you are suspicious – DO NOT open any attachments included within the email message.

So what can be done to help protect your precious files?

Firstly, ensure that your computer is fully up to date with all latest antivirus and Windows Updates – although the bad news is that the antivirus vendors are currently unable to prevent infection by Cryptolocker – but at least when they do you'll have protection in place.

Secondly, ensure you have a backup of all your files, photos, videos and documents – stored on an external location (i.e., not on your computer's hard drive) such as an external hard drive, USB pen drive or an online file storage service. This will ensure that you can restore your files should your computer ever become infected. These are both very good habits to get into anyway.

So please be vigilant and help keep your files safe!



Emergency food parcels for local people

Most of us are feeling the pinch na ncially but for some Central Bedfordshire residents, they're now at the point where they can't ao rd to buy food — and this is where the Bedfordshire Food Aid Network (BFAN) can help.

BFAN works with many of the local organisa ons that provide food parcels to get food more quickly to more local people who need it. The Network collects donated food 'en

masse' and has storage facili es across the county for local food parcel providers to use as 'larders'. The Network was the idea of Preen, the Bedfordshire based furniture reuse Community Interest Company that supports it, and also works with Central Bedfordshire Council. All food collected is used in Central Bedfordshire.
