Highways. We had a 'walkabout' around the Parish with a representative from Highways. As a result you will have seen that many of the potholes along Chalgrave Road and Toddington Road have been filled. We are pressing Central Bedfordshire Council to carry on the work along Tebworth Road, Church Lane and Featherbed Lane.

Parking. We are still concerned about the parking on Wingfield Road near the junction of Toddington Road. Many vehicles are too close to the junction making it difficult for drivers turning into Wingfield Road to see cars coming down Wingfield Road. Please park your car away from the corner.



Planning. You will probably know that the planning application for houses to be built on land behind lvy Farm in Tebworth has been approved.

Great Pond. We have researched the history of the pond and the surrounds and it has been public land for hundreds of years. The Parish Council want to take ownership of the pond so that it can be protected for our community and not be claimed by any one person. You may be aware that we have applied to Land Registry for ownership. If you want more information or to see the research please contact myself or the Clerk. The pond is full of weed at the moment but it will soon die back and we can then get in and pull it out from the roots.

Queens Head. The PC made the pub a community asset because we knew how important it is to our Parish. We are disappointed that both the Friends of the Queen's Head and Colin's and Beth's bids were unsuccessful. We will be keeping a close watch on the future of the pub. Also we are concerned about Colin Edwyn's future. He has been a great member of our community for 35+ years and a deserved recipient of the Community Award. We will do what w can to ensure a happy outcome for Colin. The Speedwatch team aims to get out once a month with the speed sign. There are three areas that we are allowed (for safety reasons) to set up the equipment, Toddington Road, Tebworth Road and Wingfield Road. We have noted a significant reduction in the amount of traffic coming through Tebworth – and thankfully a reduction in the number of lorries. Unfortunately we are still getting many drivers breaking the speed limit. To help us, the Police are going to be more visible with their speed gun.

All Saints Church. We are delighted that our Church now has a new roof. Members of the Parish Council attended the Raise the Roof event. We are also delighted to welcome our new Rector – Linda Washington.

The Parish Council meets once a month – usually the third Tuesday of the month. You are very welcome to attend. Phil Parry

VIEW FROM THE HOUSE: Andrew Selous MP

Andrew Selous has been appointed as Prime Minister's Trade Envoy to South Africa, the United Kingdom's largest export market in Africa. Trade Envoys are a network of PM appointed parliamentarians drawn from across the political spectrum. They lead UK business delegations to the countries to which they are appointed to boost British exports and increase bilateral trade.

Andrew Selous said "I'm delighted to be appointed to this role. The United Kingdom's exports to South Africa have increased by a quarter over the last 10 years. South Africa is the United Kingdom's third biggest Commonwealth trading partner and



there are significant opportunities for UK businesses in the energy, transport, health care, and education sectors. The UK currently has significant machinery, vehicle, medical, pharmaceutical, fuel and food exports to South Africa. Food and drink sales to South Africa increased by over 30% in the first quarter of 2017 in part due to significant increases in exports of animal feed for example."

THE NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED CLAIMANTS FELL AGAIN IN JULY 2017 IN SOUTH WEST BEDFORDSHIRE. Figures released today from the Independent Office of National Statistics show that the number of unemployed claimants in South West Bedfordshire constituency in 2017 was 585. This represents a rate of 1.0% of the economically active population aged 16-64, the 573rd highest of the 650 UK constituencies. (1st = highest claimant rate, 650th = lowest claimant rate.) The total number of claimants for Jobseeker's Allowance and Universal Credit is 35 lower in July compared with the previous figures released.

Commenting on the figures South West Bedfordshire MP Andrew Selous said: "I am delighted to see that more people locally now have the security of a monthly pay packet as they go out to work. There are now 3 million more people in work since 2010 under the Conservative Government".

"The Office of National Statistics has today published another set of national record-breaking figures, showing more people in work than ever, unemployment falling to the lowest rate for over 40 years and more people working full-time. Long-term unemployment is down to 374,000, a reduction of 74,000 from the previous year.

Employment: The employment rate is at a record high of 75.1% with 32.07 million people now in work.

Unemployment: The unemployment rate falls to 4.4%, the lowest since 1975.

Women: The female employment rate is at a record high of 70.5%.

Young people: The unemployment rate for 16 to 24 year olds was 12.2%, lower than for a year earlier (13.6%).

Andrew Selous went on to say, "I am also delighted to be able to attend the grand opening of Gilson UK based in on the Woodside Industrial Estate in Dunstable on the 21 September. Gilson UK provide Life Science researchers with technical products and services to enable their research. They are market leaders in Manual and Automated Liquid Handling markets. These are critical elements for Life Science research in the UK".

Incuba Centre Conference showcases way forward for zero energy bills low cost homes Following the successful Conference last Friday organised by Central Bedfordshire College and South Bedfordshire Friends of the Earth on increasing low cost affordable housing with low energy bills, South West Bedfordshire MP Andrew Selous has commended the work of British architect Bill Dunster who spoke at the Conference during Prime Minister's Questions today. The exchange in Parliament was as follows: Andrew Selous (South West Bedfordshire) Zero-energy bill homes at below market prices are being built by British architect Bill Dunster, with the support of the Building Research Establishment. Given their potential to help people find affordable housing, what more can the Government do to help expand this type of housing as part of our commitment to both enterprise and social justice?

Damian Green

I know that my hon. Friend is an energetic campaigner for social justice. This is a very good example of how having a dynamic and flexible economy is not just good for the economy, but actually good for the whole of society. I am happy to join him in welcoming this type of innovation. Bill Dunster's firm is a good example of such innovation. I know that it has been supported by the Government's enterprise investment scheme, so the Government are doing their best to support this type of measure. We are stimulating the growth of the off-site construction sector, which enables more houses to be built, through our accelerated construction programme and the home building fund. This is another very important issue to make sure that we spread the benefits of prosperity around this country.

Speaking afterwards Andrew Selous said "Bill Dunster set out a compelling case for affordable zero energy bill homes that people want to live in. There is a huge demand for affordable housing and last Friday's Conference pointed towards some solutions. I will do what I can to keep this matter at the top of the Government's list of priorities".

Chalgrave WI – Outing to the Sky Gardens and the Ceremony of the Keys at the Tower of London.

On Saturday 30 September 46 of us travelled by coach to London. We visited the Sky Gardens in the 'Walkie-Talkie' building. Had a mooch around the area and then had a private tour of the Tower of London, followed by fish and chips in the private pub of Yeoman Warders. At 9.30pm we convened outside near the Ravens' cages and were told about the Ceremony we were about to witness.

The Ceremony of the Keys takes place every night at the Tower of London and has done so for 700 years. At exactly 9.53pm, the Chief Yeoman of the Guard, dressed in Tudor Watchcoat, meets the military escort, made up of members of the Tower of London Guard. Together, the Chief Yeoman Warder and the Yeoman Warder 'Watchman' secure the main gates of the Tower. Upon their return down Water Lane, the party is halted by the sentry and challenged to identify themselves:

Sentry: "Halt! Who comes there?"

Chief Warder: "The keys."
Sentry: "Whose keys?"

Chief Warder: "Queen Elizabeth's keys", (identifying the keys as being

those of the current monarch)

Sentry: "Pass Queen Elizabeth's Keys. All is well."

Following this, the party makes its way through the Bloody Tower Archway into the fortress, where they halt at the bottom of the Broadwalk Steps. On the top of the Stairs, under the command of their officer, the Tower Guard present arms and the Chief Warder raises his hat, proclaiming:

Chief Warder: "God preserve Queen Elizabeth."

Sentry: "Amen!"

He then takes the keys to the Queen's House for safekeeping, while the Last Post is sounded.

It takes some significant outside influence to interrupt the Ceremony of the Keys. The one time when the ceremony was interrupted was during the Second World War, when there was an air raid on London, and a number of incendiary bombs fell on the old Victorian guardroom just as the Chief Yeoman Warder and the escort were coming through the Bloody Tower archway. The shock and the noise of the bombs falling blew over the escort and the Chief Yeoman Warder, but they stood up, dusted themselves down, and carried on. The Tower holds a letter from the Officer of the Guard apologising to King George VI that the ceremony was late, along with a reply from the King which says that the officer is not to be punished as the delay was due to enemy action.

We were very privileged to see the ceremony – only a small number of tickets are available to the public – currently sold out until September 2018. Our event was at the invitation of the Yeomen warders and so was extra special.

Chalgrave — Centre of the universe



Now that the days are getting shorter and the nights longer there are plenty of opportunities to get out and observe the night sky. Cold, still nights often mean clear skies. Rain washes dust and pollution out of the air making it clearer, but windy turbulent weather causes distortion when viewing far objects. This is because light is bent as it passes through layers of air of different temperatures – the same effect causes the shimmer you see on a tarmac road in very hot weather. This effect is more noticeable if you're looking through a telescope but there's plenty to see without one.

One of the benefits of living in a rural location like Chalgrave is that we are not affected by as much light pollution as those living in towns and cities. This means that on a really dark night we can see the Milky Way. It appears as a hazy ,denser band of stars arcing across the sky and best views can be had on dark autumn evenings. We are looking into the centre of our galaxy along the spiral arm on which our sun is located, and where new stars are being created in the clouds of dust and gas. The bit we can see is just a small part of the galaxy which is estimated at 100,000 light years in diameter.

If your neighbours have powerful security lights, walk a little way out of the village for better views.

One of the best meteor showers of the year, the Geminids, occurs in December. Although some meteors may be visible from the 7th to 16th December the peak of the shower will be around midnight on the 13th December. Look about 45 degrees above the eastern horizon and if you're lucky you could see up to 100 meteors an hour. The moon will be quite small at this time so should cause minimal disturbance. All you need is a clear sky.



How does your garden grow?

So summer is officially over and some of you will be saying 'What summer?' Well you must remember that week in June when it was so hot you couldn't sleep. Since then.... at least the garden has enjoyed all the rain, even if you haven't wanted to go out and look at it. A few late flowers will keep going until the frosts especially dahlias and chrysanthemums and they make good cut flowers, but they can be a bit full on for some people's taste.

But there's no need to close the back door and forget about your garden until spring – there are lots of ways to inject a bit of life into your garden in winter. Evergreens do what they say on the tin except they don't have to be green. Conifers can be yellow, bronze or grey and there are lots of dwarf varieties. Some evergreens have scented flowers: many varieties of Daphne flower in late winter and are highly scented. Sarcococca is also known as Christmas box and although the flowers are insignificant they can be in flower at Christmas. Plant winter scented plants near your house so you can smell them as you come and go and 'smell before you buy' as one person's sweet perfume is another's nasty niff!

Plants with coloured stems also look good in winter. Many varieties of Cornus (dogwood) have bright stems although they can look a bit unprepossessing the rest of the year. Plant them where they will catch the low late winter sun for best effect.

And there's still time to plant some late winter bulbs for next year. Wrap up warm and happy gardening.



Black berry and apple Jelly

Ingredients.

- 1kg blackberries
- 2 large cooking apples, roughly chopped
- Approx. 600-700g (11/4lb-1lb 6oz) granulated sugar
- 8g sachet pectin
 - You'll also need:

Jelly bag, sterilised jam jars, wax discs and lids or cellophane covers



Method:

- Put the blackberries and apples into a preserving pan or large pan and add 500ml (16fl oz) water. Bring the contents of the pan to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for about 10-15 mins, or until the fruit is soft.
- Tip the fruit into a jelly bag, and leave the mixture to strain for at least 4 hours, or preferably overnight. Don't be tempted to squeeze the bag, just let the juice drip through It because if it's squeezed, the jelly will be cloudy.
- Place a small plate in the freezer to chill.
- Discard the pulp in the jelly bag and weigh the amount of juice. An equal weight of sugar is needed. Measure out the granulated sugar, and mix the pectin into it.
- Pour the syrup into a clean pan and add the sugar with pectin. Place the pan over a medium heat and stir until the sugar dissolves.
- Increase the heat and boil the syrup rapidly for 3-4 mins. Turn off the heat. Spoon a little of the mixture on to the chilled plate. Leave it for a few mins to see if it starts to set. If it gets a skin, press it with your finger to see if it wrinkles. If the surface wrinkles, the jelly is ready. If not, return the pan to the heat and boil for a further 1-2 mins, then test the set of it again. Keep repeating this until it reaches setting point.
- Pour jelly into warm jars, filling them as high as possible. Place the wax discs on top of
 the surface, wax-side down, making sure that there are no air bubbles under the
 paper. Leave it to cool, then cover the jars with lids or cellophane covers.
 It will keep in a cool, dark place for up to 3 months. Once jars are open, store them in
 the fridge.



Scourge of Lead Theft: Peter Warburton

As we celebrate the 'Raising of the Roof' at All Saints Chalgrave and we congratulate all those responsible for its restoration, it is worth reflecting on the crime that inflicted the damage to this wonderful 13th century church building. As reported by Roger Parker in the Chalgrave News:

"In the early morning of 4th December 2015, thieves were interrupted in the process of stealing lead from the roof of All Saints Church. Three men ran off across the fields, leaving behind about half the lead they had stripped off. The other half had already been taken away in a van. The metal was removed from much of the lower roof on the south side of the church and immense damage has been caused to this Grade I listed building, probably rendering it unusable over the Christmas period."





The scale of the damage can be seen from these photos –

All Saints is not alone. Over the past 4 years, Ecclesiastical Insurance reports metal thefts of churches it insures of more than £25m, representing over 9,000 claims. As well as church and library roofs vandalised, we have seen precious memorials desecrated, artwork stolen, railway communications equipment ripped out and thefts of road signage and manhole and gully covers.

It is all the more galling that the theft from All Saints occurred when the price of lead on the London Metal Exchange (LME) was relatively low, at US\$1600 (£1100) per tonne. The price has since surged as high as US\$2400 (£1950) per tonne as the rising international price coincided with the downward lurch of Sterling last year. Indeed, the Archdeacons of the Church of England issued an alert in December 2016,

warning of the heightened potential for the theft of lead from church roofs due to its increased scrap value. The proximate cause of the rise in the price of lead is China's voracious appetite for industrial and construction materials to service the modernisation of its vast economy. At a stretch, the spate of lead thefts is an unintended consequence of China's rapid economic development.

Yet the crime of lead theft has a long history. There have been specific criminal offences relating to scrap metal dealing since the 17th century. The provisions of the Criminal Law Act of 1781 carried a maximum penalty of seven years' transportation to Australia. As with many property offences, the conviction rates are very low. It is viewed as a low priority for the law enforcement agencies and even where the perpetrators are caught, cases often collapse for lack of reliable evidence.


Our parliament has been goaded into action in recent years to address this injustice and the outcome was a Private Member's Bill, the Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013. Here are some of its provisions:

"A scrap metal dealer must not receive scrap metal from a person without verifying the person's full name and address. That verification must be by reference to documents, data or other information obtained from a reliable and independent source. A scrap metal dealer must not pay for scrap metal except (a) by a cheque which is not transferable, or (b) by an electronic transfer of funds (authorised by credit or debit card or otherwise). If a scrap metal dealer receives any scrap metal in the course of the dealer's business: the dealer must record the description of the metal, including its type (or types if mixed), form, condition, weight and any marks identifying previous owners or other distinguishing features and the date and time of its receipt."

Sadly, the tightening up of the regulation of the scrap metal trade proved no consolation for All Saints, but we hope that other churches and public buildings will be spared the trauma in future as thieves lose access to a ready cash market for stolen metals. And perhaps we could strike a deal with Outer Mongolia for the transportation of future criminals.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS: Tebworth Friendly Society

We were first shown this little book by Ted and Barbara Yirrell way back in the 70's and David Yirrell has kindly loaned it for me to scan. It is clear that the Five Horseshoes was what is now Buttercup Farm although I can find no historical record of this. The book is



written and decorated in beautiful hand script and you can see all pages on the Chalgrave websites http://www.chalgravepc.org.uk/local-history/parish-history/the-tebworth-friendly-society-circa-1750/

Rules to join were strict. No one over 45, No one who appears "sickly, lame or infirm. No one remarkable for cursing, swearing, drunkenness, prophaning [sic] the lord's day, fighting, quarrelsome or known to have contracted the "foul disease" For a payment of 1s per month plus 3d "towards the discharge of the reckoning" [5p and 1.25p] the benefits were, after being a member for two years, "if one fell sick or lame as to be disabled from supporting himself" would receive 1 shilling per day. Any member "Past his Work" would receive 4s per week [20p] for as long a time as such a member shall live. Unless of course is becomes guilty of the offences above!

The rules on the stewards were strict as well. The steward in charge of the money was given a key to the box. If he did not attend the monthly meeting he had to pay 2s and if he lost the key it would be broken open at his expense and he would be expelled forthwith. How the box was kept secure was not defined!

There is no date but the names of the stewards were William Shaw, William Buckingham and the auditor was George Read. The name written in the front of the book is M Tearle. From Chalgrave records, we can see that a William Shaw was born 1735 died 1816 and William Buckingham died 1802 so it would seem likely that the society was started around the mid to late 1700's

Chalgrave used to be very different back in the day. Life was slower and simpler. It followed the gentle rhythms of the seasons, dictating how people worked and how they played. When you listen to the stories our older residents tell, it's like travelling back in time and opening a fascinating window into a world that has long since disappeared.



HARVEST HOME

'The community depended on the land for work and for food, so harvest was a very busy time. Everyone got involved, even the children. Wheat, barley and oats were cut and stacked in the fields. Most of the men in the village worked on the local farms. We used to take them baskets of food and tea. Children would play among the stacks and slide down the haystacks, much to the farmers' dismay.

With the harvest safely gathered in, to celebrate, a Harvest festival was held and the children, most of whom went to Chalgrave School, went house to house collecting items to decorate the Wesleyan Chapel. It looked beautiful. The ladies of the village would arrange stacks of wheat and corn and make wonderful displays of food and flowers. People grew their own vegetables back then so there was a lot to give and afterwards it was auctioned off and villagers would be able to buy the things they didn't grow themselves.

Some of us came a few weeks ago and had a fabulous meal. The great triumph was the Cod and Chips and the Roast Beef which were beautifully cooked and presented. A great bottle of Sauvignon Blanc cost £11. Front of house was a friendly, family atmosphere maintained by Amy and very attentive staff.




