2023 Parish Assembly—Chair's Report

The Parish Council consists of myself as the Chair, I am the Council representative on the West Trust; lead the Speed Watch Team and I am on the Bedfordshire Association of Town and Parish Councils; Ken Green who is the Vice Chair and heads up the Footpaths Committee, Peter Warburton leads the Planning Committee, looks after our website and organises the Litter Picking activities; Kevin Ludgate, Harvey Greenwood who is responsible for Police Liaison and is not only our newest



member but also the youngest member of the team and of course our Clerk Lesley Smith.

Jan Day and Frances Masters have stepped down from the Council and we would like to thank them for their work.

We work on a voluntary basis trying to do as much as we can for our local community. As well as our monthly meetings and individual responsibilities we attend local and area meetings where decisions can made that affect our Parish. We lobby MP's and local councillors, we defend the rural nature of our community, we encourage and support local activities, we look for ways of improving facilities and the infrastructure, we strive to keep our community spirit and, as your representatives, we listen to you.

Our Precept this year is £8664. About a quarter of the precept goes straight back into our community in the form of grants and awards – we are limited to the amount we are allowed to allocate for grants. We keep a third for contingencies and the rest is used in the running of the Council activities.

The accounts can be viewed on our website or via the Clerk.

Our work over the past year included reporting fly tipping and potholes, reviewing planning applications, keeping footpaths clear, keeping gulley's clear and much more.

We have two solar farms to be developed in our Parish. We are in conversation with the developers of both solar farms to discuss community benefit or funding for projects in the Parish.

We are pressing for a site meeting with CBC Highways to discuss more substantial traffic calming measures and protection for One Home Farm on the first bend on the Toddington Road. That property has been hit by speeding cars six times over the years. The Speed Watch Team are out once a month in Tebworth and Wingfield to

remind drivers of the speed limit.

We are aware that the sight lines coming out of Chalgrave Road onto the B5120 are not good. The bushes are overgrown, and we are tracing and contacting the landowner to ask that they cut them back.

We are in contact with the planning department about the development at Ivy Farm. The building is not what was in the original agreed planning application. The building should have larch or oak cladding on it which would soften the look of the building. The building at the moment looks nothing like the artists impression on the boards outside.

We are looking into rewilding some of the verges in the Parish and to do something with the land opposite the Queens Head.

We are fortunate to live in a low crime area. However, there are break-ins and burglaries so please make sure that doors and windows are locked and outbuildings are secure. It is important to report anything that you think is suspicious and report any crimes.

The Millennium Youth and the Community Awards for the past year. We need nominations. Both awards are to recognise a significant achievement or community service. The Millennium Youth Award is for 18 years and under and is a 'well done' for academic or sporting achievement, contribution to the community, overcoming difficulties, or other significant achievement. The Community Award is for over eighteens and is a 'thank you' for service to the community. If you have a nomination please contact the Clerk, Lesley Smith, or any of the councillors. Finally, The Parish Council have specially designed Coronation mugs for young

people of our Parish as a reminder of this momentous occasion. The mugs are free for any under 18s living in the Parish.

They can be collected from the Parish Clerk.

You are invited to any of our meetings. They are usually on the third Tuesday of the month in the Memorial Hall at 7:30.

Minutes of our meetings are posted on the Chalgrave Parish Council website and on the notice boards.

View from The House

Andrew Selous MP for South West Bedfordshire kindly joined the Parish Assembly. He updated the Parish Council and residents on the following:

- a) General Practice is a main issue in this area. The number of surgeries and available appointments is already below average. Covid and the number of new houses are having an adverse effect. However the Luton and Dunstable Hospital is due for a big expansion.
- b) Policing. The impact of the rural funding formula is not good because Bedfordshire is treated as a rural area. The government has made a commitment to change the funding formula. Mr Selous also has issues with the allocation of officers.
- c) Traffic through Hockliffe. The police have worked with National Highways between January and March 2022. During that time the police issued 257 fixed penalty notices for speeding. National Highways has promised to do something about controlling the speed of traffic through Hockliffe.
- d) Business Skills Shortages. There are staff shortages for some local businesses and there is a danger some of them might fold.
- e) Buses. More money is available for providing local buses. The government has provided £2.7 million and Central Bedfordshire Council has also provided money.
- f) Education. Key Stage 2 results are not as good as they should be therefore extra money has been provided for our area. A register for home schooling is to be set up.
- g) Fly Tipping. Mr Selous is pleased that the parish council has contacted McDonalds regarding the amount of their litter found in the parish.

MORE NEWS FROM ANDREW FOR THIS EDITION:

'Health issues, and general practice in particular, continue to take up a great deal of my time. Since the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care's visit to Leighton Buzzard last month, I have met with him again to check on the progress of providing additional health facilities for Leighton Buzzard as a result of the newfound ability to release value from the 4 acres of NHS owned land on Vandyke Road, something that we have not been able to do for the last 35 years. I am expecting an update on the scoping exercise to look at which additional health facilities will be brought to the town, undertaken by Bedfordshire, Luton and Milton Keynes Integrated Care Board, early next week. One GP practice moved into the Grove View integrated health and care hub on

the 2nd of May and additional services will be moving into it shortly. Houghton Regis continues to grow with the new developments in Bidwell and Linmere. I have raised the need for additional health facilities for the town with both the Chancellor of the Exchequer and with the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care.

On a related health issue, I've become the Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Bladder and Bowel Continence Care, a very important issue for those affected about which there is still far too much stigma.

In Parliament I raised the changes that BBC is proposing to make to BBC 3 Counties Radio, which are not good for our area, and I have asked the BBC management to think again. I have also raised in Parliament, the continuing murder of Christians in Nigeria, including as recently as on Palm Sunday and Good Friday. This issue does not get the attention it deserves in our media. I hosted a meeting with electric vehicle manufacturers in Parliament and was encouraged by the progress which is being made. We will need much greater capacity, and it needs to be cheaper to connect to the grid to enable everyone to take advantage of the new green technologies of the future.

The Government is undertaking a major piece of work on how to achieve this and will have proposals later this year. I also attended a meeting of the All Party Parliamentary Group on Cycling and Walking and remain a keen supporter of active travel to improve our health and reduce congestion. It was also good to be able to vote for more stringent controls on our water companies to make our rivers cleaner, and I am pleased that Anglian Water have committed that sewage issues will no longer be damaging the health of our rivers and seas in our area by 2030. There is a £56 billion investment programme to improve water quality and this will be achieved without a massive increase in water bills.

It was a huge pleasure to be a guest of Leighton Buzzard Rotary as they hosted another highly successful May Fayre last Monday. I would like to thank all the Rotary clubs for the tremendous work they do for so many people in our local communities across my constituency.'

West's Educational Charity

EDITORS' NOTE: It has been some time since a detailed report has been included in the Chalgrave news magazine and new people moving into the parish should take note of this amazing charity.

West's Educational Charity is a local charity which gives grants to young people aged 24 and under residing in the parishes of Hockliffe or Chalgrave. The grants must be for an educational purpose.

The background to the Charity – Francis West, by will dated 31 March 1690, directed £400 to be laid out in land, the rents thereof to be equally divided amongst the poor of Chalgrave and Hockliffe, to enable them to put their children to school, with a conditional gift over for testator's poor relations. The legacy was laid out in the purchase of lands in Simpson, Bucks., in lieu of which 33 acres, or thereabouts, were allotted in 1766 on the enclosure in that parish, producing about £32 a year, which under an order of the Charity Commissioners of 4 April 1905 was determined to be wholly applicable for educational purposes, and was carried to the general account of the National school at Chalgrave which was also attended by the children of Hockliffe.

Fortunately, this land was in the Milton Keynes designated area and the capital is now considerable and grants are made twice a year by the trustees.

The Trustees meet in January and July. Applications will be considered at the January meeting if received by the clerk on or before 31 December of the previous year. Applications will be considered at the July meeting if received by the clerk on or before 30 June of that year. If a deadline is missed the application will automatically be considered at the next meeting. For example, an application received on 1 January 2024 will be considered at the July 2024 meeting.

New guidelines (2020 onwards)

- Applicants must reside in the parishes of Hockliffe or Chalgrave and be aged 24 or under.
- All applications on behalf of children/young people under the age of 18 at the time of the application must be made by a parent/carer on behalf of that child/young person.
- All applications on behalf of young people aged 18 to 24 at the time of the application must be made by that young person him/herself.
- We would usually expect to pay: -

West's Educational Charity

- (a) a student grant of not less than £200 per half year for those studying full time for a degree
- (b) a contribution towards costs of post 16 education (e.g. part-time college, apprenticeships etc)
- (c) 50% of cost of lessons in the performing arts (music, dance, drama etc)
- (d) 50% of cost of sporting activities (football, rugby, cricket, riding etc)
- (e) 75% of cost of swimming lessons
- We will continue to make contributions to school trips of an educational nature (This does not include trips which are wholly for leisure, such as Alton Towers, Legoland etc.) An application will only be considered after the trip has been paid for in full and only after the trip has taken place. In exceptional cases, however, if there is real difficulty paying in advance, the Trustees may consider an early application.
- We will only pay routine travel expenses in exceptional circumstances.
- There will be a maximum grant per child/young person per application, which will vary from meeting to meeting depending upon funds available, except for: –(a) those receiving the minimum £200 student grant(b) out-of-theordinary, one-off events(c) exceptional circumstances.

It is very important that people remember that these are only examples. Anyone aged 24 or under residing in Hockliffe or Chalgrave is encouraged to apply for a grant towards any educational activity.

Application forms can be downloaded from the Chalgrave Parish Council website under Organisations or collected from the Clerk to the Trustees – Lesley Smith.

Completed forms, along with receipts, must be sent to Lesley Smith before December 31^{st} and before June 30^{th}

Before I say anything else, I would like you



all to give Roger a round of applause for all his hard work over the years. After the Covid years, bookings for the hall have not improved, and we are well down compared with pre Covid. We will endeavour to pursue more fundraising, as this is important for the upkeep of the building and surrounds. We hosted a bingo night and we hosted a lovely jubilee party last June.

This year, some of our biggest expenditure will be an upgrade of our fire alarm system and emergency lighting. This has been ordered and work will commence in the near future. We are also getting quotes for repairs and replacement of some of our gutters, soffits and fascias. Most of you will know that parts of the children's' playground have been dismantled for Health & Safety reasons. The playground was constructed at the same time as the hall out of the same funding source and a replacement is outside our means. We are in the process of applying for Lottery funding and possibly funding from the new solar farm..



We have also said goodbye to some of our members but also welcomed new ones.. We have redrafted our constitution to meet current governance rules.

In February we read Bite of the Mango by Mariatu Kamara & Susan McClelland

As a child in a small rural village in Sierra Leone, Mariatu Kamara lived peacefully surrounded by family and friends.

Rumors of rebel attacks were no more than a distant worry.

But when 12-year-old Mariatu set out for a neighboring village, she never arrived. Heavily armed rebel soldiers, many no older than children themselves, attacked and tortured Mariatu. During this brutal act of senseless violence they cut off both her hands. Stumbling through the countryside, Mariatu miraculously survived.

The sweet taste of a mango, her first food after the attack, reaffirmed her desire to live, but the challenge of clutching the fruit in her bloodied arms reinforced the grim new reality that stood before her. With no parents or living adult to support her and living in a refugee camp, she turned to begging in the streets of Freetown.

In this gripping and heart breaking true story, Mariatu shares with readers the details of the brutal attack, its aftermath and her eventual arrival in Toronto. There she began to pull together the pieces of her broken life with courage, astonishing resilience and hope.



In March we read My sister the Serial Killer by Oyinkan Braithwiate

When Korede's dinner is interrupted one night by a distress call from her sister, Ayoola, she knows what's expected of her: bleach, rubber gloves, nerves of steel and a strong stomach.


This'll be the third boyfriend Ayoola's dispatched in, quote, self-defence and the third mess that her lethal little sibling has left Korede to clear away. She should probably go to the police for the good of the menfolk of Nigeria, but she loves her sister and, as they say, family always comes first.

Until, that is, Ayoolastarts dating the doctor where Korede works as a nurse. Korede's long been in love with him, and isn't prepared to see him wind up with a knife in his back: but to save one would mean sacrificing the other. This book makes you think about how far you would go to protect your family.

In April we read The Fever Tree by Jennifer McVeigh

Frances Irvine, left penniless after her father's sudden death, is forced to emigrate to the Cape.

In this barren country, she meets two very different men - one driven by ambition, the other by ideals. When a smallpox outbreak sends her to the diamond mines, she is drawn into a ruthless world of greed and exploitation, of human lives crushed in the scramble for power. But here - at last - she sees her path to happiness. Torn between passion and integrity, she makes a choice that has devastating consequences. This book gave us lots of information on life in South Africa in 1800 and what a difficult place it was for women. We really enjoyed this book, a tangled love story with twists.

Our Easter celebrations were joyous, with Chalgrave Church being beautifully decorated for Palm Sunday and Easter morning services. During Lent we also shared special times together over Lent lunches which raised funds for charity, a Lent discussion course, and a



Maundy Thursday meal followed by a Benefice service with St George's at Toddington.

The excitement is building as we approach King Charles III Coronation this week and we enjoyed this month's Coronation Pop Up Tea Room. They are such a wonderful chance to get together as we enjoy lovely cakes and chat. On Friday, May 12th there will be a Benefice Service of Thanksgiving for King Charles III at 6.30pm at St George's Church Toddington. The Quintet Choir will sing a couple of celebratory pieces, and Royal British Legion Representatives will be present.

Looking forward, we have, unfortunately, had to postpone both the upcoming Harpsichord concert and the Afternoon Cream Tea with Toddington Town Band due to a structural problem with a beam in the church Chancel.

We first noticed a problem months ago with traces of brown dust gathering on the Chancel side wall. On further investigation, and the opening of a large hole in the chancel roof, it has been discovered that the beam has completely rotted away at one end, due to damp, and needs urgent repair. Scaffolding has been erected and a screw jack is holding the beam up. The chancel has been cordoned off as a no access area. Due to Health & Safety and Fire regulations, we are not able to have large numbers of people in the church as the chancel has no alternate escape access. We are hopeful that the repairs will be done soon.

Despite this, our Sunday morning weekly services continue at 9.30am and we would love you to join us and promise you a warm welcome. On Sunday 19 May, the service will start slightly later at 10.30am, followed by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, and afterwards refreshments. Do please come if you can.

It has been sad to say farewell to Sheila Parkes and Sheila Deamer, this year and to Jean Ludgate last year. It was a privilege to hold their funeral services in church. They were all longstanding members of Chalgrave Parish and we pay tribute to them.





WILD CHALGRAVE

THE GREAT POND

You may have noticed that some of the willows around the Great Pond were cut down late last year. These were vigorous species that probably started as seedlings many years ago. If left unpruned they would rapidly grow out over the footpath causing an obstruction and so had to be pollarded every few years.





As the pond is in a conservation area planning permission has to be obtained before pruning or removing any trees. The Parish Council contacted Central Bedfordshire's tree officer who suggested that the willows be replaced with less vigorous species. We have now planted two varieties of salix alba, smaller willows with brightly coloured new stems. They will still need some pruning but should be much easier to manage and we hope that in a few years they might look something like the pictures below. Janet Day



HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?

Re-wilding — it's the latest fashion in gardening, even at the Chelsea Flower Show but how do you do it? If you walked out of your garden and didn't go back for a couple of years it would be re-wilded but it wouldn't be what most of us recognise as a garden. The good news is you don't have to go the whole hog and it might even mean less work. The main thing is not to be too tidy and I consider myself a pioneer in this. Start with your lawn if you have one. Let the grass grow longer and don't stress



about the weeds in it, or maybe set aside part of it to create a mini meadow. Even a small meadow area will provide food and shelter for a wide variety of wildlife.



Red Clover Yarrow Dandelion Nettle

Be relaxed about the weeds in the rest of your garden too. Dandelions provide nectar for early bumblebees and nettles are an essential food source for the caterpillars of peacock and small tortoiseshell butterflies.

If cultivating nettles is a step too far for you the hedgerows and footpaths of Chalgrave seem well-supplied with them. Yarrow flowers for a long time even in dry conditions and is good for short tongued insects like hoverflies. Red clover is a particularly good nectar source and along with daisies can be attractive in lawns.

What we call weeds can grow and flower in almost any weather throughout the year and although this can be a nuisance to us gardeners it's what makes them so useful to wildlife. After flowering their seeds are food for birds and small mammals. Many weeds have more attractive cultivated forms but don't choose double-flowered ones as insects can't get at the nectar and pollen. If the idea of cultivating weeds horrifies

you maybe you could set aside a hidden corner of your garden as a wild habitat. Make a log pile for beetles or amphibians, or a pile of sticks and leaves for small

mammals or a hedgehog.

Or how about 'adopting' an area of grass verge near your house for a spot of guerrilla gardening. Some residents of Chalgrave have already done that.

Whatever the weather, enjoy your gardening.

Recipe Corner

Devonshire Honey cake from Chris McDonagh aka Cider Lil., a Tebworthian resident who now lives in Devon sharing her wonderful Devonian recipes.



Easy Devonshire honey cake is perfect for a cream tea or enjoying with your afternoon cuppa.

Ingredients

250g <u>clear honey</u>, plus about 2 tbsp extra to glaze 225g unsalted butter 100g muscovado sugar 3 large beaten eggs 300g self-raising flour



Method

Preheat the oven to fan 140C/ conventional 160C/gas 3.

Butter and line a 20cm round loose bottomed cake tin.

Cut the butter into pieces and drop into a medium pan with the honey and sugar. Melt slowly over a low heat. When the mixture looks quite liquid, increase the heat under the pan and boil for about one minute. Leave to cool for 15-20 minutes, to prevent the eggs cooking when they are mixed in.

Beat the eggs into the melted honey mixture using a wooden spoon. Sift the flour into a large bowl and pour in the egg and honey mixture, beating until you have a smooth, quite runny batter. Pour the mixture into the tin and bake for 50 minutes-1 hour until the cake is well-risen, golden brown and springs back when pressed. A skewer pushed into the centre of the cake should come out clean.


